The 25th degree, Knight of the Brazen Serpent, or Sufi Master

In order to improve the education in the Scottish Rite, Taipei Bodies have initiated the performance of degree work in long form during its Stated Meetings. In October, the 5th degree, Secret Master was presented during the Lodge of Perfection Stated Meeting. In November, at the Council of Kadosh Stated Meeting, the 25th degree was performed.

Although very short this degree is rather complex by its name and its history.

The first name is related to the Bible, referring to the brazen serpent built by Moses to protect the Hebrews from the poisonous snakes (Numbers, 21). This was the title of the degree in the original rituals of Albert Pike (The Magnum Opus, 1857). The Hebrew were in great despair with their wandering in the desert, with no other food than the manna sent by God and murmured against him. As punishment, God sent them a lot of poisonous snakes, causing the death of many Hebrews. The ritual

features a repenting Hebrew asking Moses to pray God to end the malediction.

The Lord said to Moses, "Make a snake and put it up on a pole; anyone who is bitten can look at it and live."

So Moses made a bronze snake and put it up on a pole. Then when anyone was bitten by a snake and looked at the bronze snake, they lived

The teaching of the ritual was to satisfy yourself with what you receive from God.

At the end of the XIXth Century, western world discovered the wisdom and philosophy of Islam. This may be the reason why Albert Pike switches totally the ritual for a Muslim reference, by referring to the Druses¹. Druse is an Islamic esoteric and initiatic sect which still exists in the mountains of Lebanon. It is very secretive and do not accept conversions. The ritual is the one described in A Bridge to Light as the Older Pike Ritual².

However, the Supreme Council switched to reference to Sufism in the Revised Standard Pike Ritual in 2000.

Sufism is the esoteric and initiatic philosophy of Islam. The Sufi Moslems are seeking for interiorization, love of God, contemplation, wisdom. Muhammad allegedly received at the same time as the Koran, esoteric revelations that he would have shared only with some of his followers, in particular Ali his son in law. Sufism advocates the existence of hidden knowledge (*ilm al batin*) and an ideal of non-attachment to the things of this world and inner struggle against vice.


The Sufism is as important for Islam, as the Kabala is for Judaism.

The origin of Sufism is almost the same as the origin of Islam, with Ali, the son in law of Muhammad, being very instrumental in the development of the doctrine, common to the two branches of Islam, Sunnis and Shiites.

Like Freemasonry, Sufism is constituted of brotherhoods with a Master Sufi within an Order, with a double objective to improve oneself, and to aid and assist ones neighbor.

As the 25th degree is among the Chivalric degrees, we can note that these development were taking place at the time of the Crusades, and that there were communication between these brotherhoods and the Templars in particular, involving cross influences between the two. Note that in the trial of the Templars several accusations were related to such influence (the secret order, the Baphomet,...)

One point in common between these three successive rituals is that they all take place in the desert, where the sky is pure and most of stars visible. This appears on the regalia of the degree, and the reading of the 25th section of Morals and

Dogma introduces many instructive references to cosmography, astronomy and astrology.

Administration
